The Honourable Michel Bastarache, who served as a judge on the Supreme Court of Canada from 1997 to 2008, and Jean-François Gaudreault-DesBiens, Dean of the Faculty of Law of the Université de Montréal, will preside.

Mission and objectives

The mission of the Observatory is to promote access to information relating to language rights in both fundamental and dynamic terms. Devoted mainly to political and legal issues pertaining to official language minority rights in Canada, the Observatory is also interested in the evolution of diversity in Canada, particularly in relation to the realities faced by indigenous peoples. For obvious reasons, the linguistic situation in Quebec will also be analyzed.

Under the auspices of the Université de Montréal's Centre de recherche en droit public (CRDP), the Observatory has been mandated to collect and disseminate all information relating to the linguistic rights of groups subjected to new paradigms in this area. In addition to an exhaustive overview of pertinent legislation, jurisprudential decisions and doctrinal work, the Observatory will also be responsible for organizing various educational and scientific activities, including colloquia and seminars.

Members of the Observatory are actively engaged in traditional and social media, as well as in events relating to language issues outside traditional academic frameworks. Media monitoring, combined with a blog run by its co-directors and open to scholars, researchers, and correspondents, will optimize the quality of dialogue exchanged between the Observatory, the academic world and civil society.

Finally, special attention will be paid to international jurisdictions with specific linguistic sensibilities. In this vein, the Observatory will look at current academic contributions to the subject in Catalonia, Belgium, Italy, Switzerland, Morocco, French-speaking West Africa, Southern Africa, Russia and Peru, which will contribute to the international reputation of the Observatory's work and, in turn, to that of the Faculty of Law of the Université de Montréal.
